(5 miles west of Port Angeles on Hwy. 101; right on Laird Rd.— becomes Edgewood Dr.)

Parking: Dry Creek School, 25 Rife Rd.
(Approximately ¼ mile west of Grange Hall on Rife Rd. Walk about ½ mile to site.)

Bring: shovel, work clothes, gloves, rain gear, including boots, and, if staying all day, lunch.

At the site: You'll find instruction from tree planting experts, snacks, water and great people.

At Grange Hall: Snacks and drinks during the day. You can leave a potluck dish there.
Volunteer hosts there will get it ready for the 4 p.m. fellowship.

The late Harry Lydiard lived an ethic that emphasized sustainability and conservation of exceptional qualities of land. The tree farms he purchased and thousands of trees he planted on them were part of his personal commitment toward sustainability. His legal agreements with North Olympic Land Trust ensure that nearly 340 acres of fertile land always will be available to grow trees and other appropriate agricultural products.
